
How to Make a Pull Bead Rosary, St. Therese of Lisieux (the Little Flower) style

supplies: 53 circular pony beads (Hail Marys) + 6 heart beads (Our Fathers) + 1 crucifx + Miraculous Medal (optional) + twine = 1 Rosary

Burn the ends of the twine to reduce fraying and make it easier to bead. For bead type and twine size/length recommendations reference supply chart. String your rosary in the order as shown below, with twine going through the crucifix & beads in the direction of the arrows:



string crucifix, with twine equal length on both sides, make the 1st knot to secure the crucifix at center. Follow with a heart, 3 circles and another heart



The sign of the cross & creed,

Our Father,

faith hope charity Hail Marys

Glory Be & Fatima Prayer

are prayed on these.

1st decade - 10 beads strung this way (twine in opposing directions)

2nd decade - 10 beads strung this way (twine in opposing directions)

3rd decade - 10 beads strung this way (twine in opposing directions)


4th decade - 10 beads strung this way (twine in opposing directions)

5th decade - 10 beads strung this way-NO heart follows,

beading is completed



then a heart (both twine go the same direction).



The Mystery, an Our Father, followed by 10 Hail Marys, a Glory Be and Fatima Prayer make up a decade. Each decade is prayed while contemplating one of the corresponding mysteries (1-5). These are either: Joyful, Luminous, Sorrowful, or Glorious

You now have a long string of beads. Straighten and tighten all the beads. Leave at least 1.5 inches of tie space after 2nd heart strung and a small enough space around the other hearts that they don't turn cockeyed. See the back of this sheet for a picture of the finished rosary.


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
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
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
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
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1st barrel knot is made to secure the crucifix, then begin the beading.

Beads are strung in one long strand and include the 5 decades...

the second barrel knot is made after all the beads have been strung. The knot creates a circle of decades thus finishing up the rosary.
